MAXIMILIAN BECKER is a research assistant at the Institute for Contemporary History Munich-Berlin. He is editing the speeches of Adolf Hitler 1933-1945 as well as working on a study about international survivors' and resistance fighters' organizations in the context of the Cold War. His doctorate, *Mitstreiter im Volkstumskampf: Deutsche Justiz in den eingegliederten Ostgebieten 1939-1945*, will appear in Polish translation. Becker was i. a. a research fellow of the Vienna Wiesenthal Institute for Holocaust Studies (VWI) and academic collaborator of the Max Planck Institute for European Legal History.

MAGNUS BRECHTKEN studied history, political sciences and philosophy; PhD at the University of Bonn in 1994. Assistant Professor at the Universities of Bayreuth (1994-1995) and Munich (1995-2002). After his Habilitation in 2002 he became DAAD-Langzeitdozent at the University of Nottingham. In 2012 he was appointed Deputy Director of the Institute for Contemporary History Munich-Berlin. He is also professor at the University of Munich. He has published on German, British and American International History, Memory Studies, History of Modern Antisemitism, and National Socialism and its aftermath. He recently published a biography of Albert Speer (*Albert Speer: Eine deutsche Karriere*, München 2017).

WŁADYSŁAW BUŁHAK studied history at Warsaw University; PhD at the Institute of History, Polish Academy of Sciences, Warsaw, in 1998; from 1999 to 2006, and from 2011 to 2016 deputy director at the Public Education Office of the Institute of National Remembrance (IPN) in Warsaw responsible for research; 2016-present – senior researcher at the Historical Research Office of the IPN in Warsaw. Member of the editorial board of *Wywiad i kontrwywiad Polski XX w.* (Polish intelligence and counterintelligence in XXth Century, published annually). He has published on Polish-Russian relations, intelligence and counter-intelligence of Polish underground during the German occupation of Poland, and Polish communist intelligence.

ADAM DZIUROK, PhD, DSc, is an associate professor at Cardinal Stefan Wyszyński University in Warsaw, and head of the Historical Research Department of the Institute of National Remembrance in Katowice. He specialized in research on the post-war history of Upper Silesia and on church history in the Polish People's Republic. Author/editor of 30 book publi-

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PAULINA GULIŃSKA-JURGIEL, PhD, research fellow at the Aleksander Brückner Center for Polish Studies in Halle. 2009-2012 research fellow at the Centre for Contemporary History Potsdam (Zentrum für Zeithistorische Forschung Potsdam) with a post-doc project *A Discursive Translation of Change: Coming to Terms with the Past in the Parliamentary Debates in the Aftermaths of Dictatorship*. In 2009 PhD in cultural sciences at the European University Viadrina, Frankfurt/Oder (Germany) with a work examining discourses on Europe in the Eastern Bloc countries (1965-1976). Research interests: coming to terms with the dictatorial past after 1945, democratic transitions in Europe, history of Poland and East Central Europe in the 20th century.

INGO MÜLLER studied law and political science (Dr. jur; Dr. phil) and was an administrative lawyer in Bonn and Bremen. 1995-2008 professor for criminal law and criminal procedural law at the Police University in Hamburg. Retired since 2008. Internationally known for his book *Furchtbare Juristen: Die unbewältigte Vergangenheit unserer Justiz* (München, 1987) which was translated into English (*Hitler's Justice: The Courts of the Third Reich*, Cambridge, Mass. 1991), Spanish and Chinese. Numerous further publications in the field of contemporary legal history, especially on justice in the "Third Reich" and in postwar Germany.

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NIKITA PETROV, PhD, vice-chairman of the Board of Memorial's Scientific Research Centre in 1990, and named expert to the Commission of the Supreme Soviet of the Russian Federation on Archives of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and the KGB in 1991. In 1992 named expert to the Constitutional Court on the "CPSU Affair". Petrov frequently worked in the archives of the CPSU and the KGB, and prepared a number of publications on the history of Soviet terror. His research includes the history of state security and terror and the history of trials of German war captives in the USSR. He is the author of 21 scholarly books and more than 170 articles.

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IRYNA RAMANOVA, PhD, professor of history at the European Humanities University (Vilnius). Her research explores the relationship between authority and society in the period of Stalinism and in the years after it. She is the author of a large number of articles on Stalinism, famine, repressions, and rehabilitation in the BSSR. Recent publication: *Power and Society: BSSR in the 1930s (Documents of the Secret Department/Special Sector of the Central Committee of the Communist Party [Bolsheviks] BSSR)*, 2 Vol., Minsk 2019 (in Belorussian and Russian). She has been a visiting fellow at the Institute of Slavic, East European and Eurasian Studies (University of California, Berkeley), La Fondation Maison des Sciences de l’Homme (L’ecole hautes etudes de sciences sociales, France, Paris), as well as visiting professor at the Le Centre et le Département d’histoire, à Sciences Po (Paris).

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JÜRGEN ZARUSKY studied history, German philology and political sciences; PhD at the University of Munich in 1990 (*Die deutschen Sozialdemokraten und das sowjetische Modell 1917-1933*, München 1992). Since 1990 Zarusky researched at the Institute for Contemporary History Munich-Berlin. Since 2016 he was chief editor of the journal *Vierteljahrshefte für Zeitgeschichte*. Editor of *Mitteilungen* of the Gemeinsame Kommission für die Erforschung der jüngeren Geschichte der deutsch-russischen Beziehungen. His work includes publications on National Socialism, Stalinism, Totalitarianism and Memorial Cultures in Europe. Jürgen Zarusky passed away suddenly after a short illness on 4 March 2019 before this volume went to print.
